Taking Action to Support the Global Goals

Below are just a few examples of how we're utilizing entrepreneurial approaches to support the SDGs.

Promoting Healthcare Access for Women in Need

Through a collaboration with the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation and the Children's Investment Fund Foundation, Pfizer has helped broaden access to our long-acting, injectable contraceptive for women most in need in 69 of the world's poorest countries.



Partnering to End Blinding Trachoma

We have broken new ground in pursuing the bold goal of eliminating the world's leading infectious cause of blindness via the International Trachoma Initiative, a large-scale partnership which involves more than 100 diverse organizations.



Conserving Water Resources

As part of our efforts to preserve water resources in communities where we operate, Pfizer has implemented at its facilities an approach that includes quantifying water withdrawal, reporting performance against reduction targets and furthering efficiencies in water reuse and recycling.



Striving to Limit Global Warming

Pfizer's third greenhouse gas reduction goal since 2000, which aims to reduce emissions by 20 percent from our 2012 baseline, has been recognized as a Science Based Target by the initiative led by the Carbon Disclosure Project, the UN Global Compact, the World Resources Institute and the World Wildlife Fund.
